World Day of the Poor 2024

The Eighth world day of the Poor is on Sunday 17 November. In his message for this World Day of the Poor, the Holy Father reiterates that "the poor hold a privileged place in God's heart" and invites everyone to learn to pray for the poor and to pray together with the poor, with humility and trust. We know that poverty is a significant issue both in the UK and globally. In the week running up to World Day of the Poor, we are all encouraged to pray, reflect and engage in concrete actions against poverty by deepening our encounter with the poor in our communities and considering how we can respond to their needs. We can all take small actions that together make a big difference.

Live Simply – Attract Wildlife To Our Church Grounds

Bees and other insect pollinators are essential for biodiversity through maintaining healthy plant populations, which in turn impact on everything from supporting animal species to food security for humans. This is one way of trying to do our bit to address the decline in pollinators.



Paul Burridge from the Launceston Beekeeping Group came to St Cuthbert Mayne and gave an excellent, very informative presentation.

Bees are brilliant pollinators. There are two types of bees, solitary and social. The solitary bees are carpenter, mining, and masonry bees. The social bees are bumble bees, of which there are 24 varieties, and the honey bee.

We learned that there are many plants and trees from which honey bees forage their pollen and nectar from. Their favourite source is from the Horse Chestnut tree which has the highest level of sugar in their nectar, all fruit trees are also a popular source of pollen, as are wildflowers. The importance of having a variety of flowers, shrubs, and trees in a garden throughout the year was stressed, to ensure that pollen and nectar are available as there is a short window when nectar and pollen is produced by plants. Pollen comes in all different colours dependant on what the bees have foraged on. Pollinators do not discriminate between weeds and flowers.

Honeybees are quite unique and are master engineers. A social group of bees is called a colony, living in the same location year in, year out. They do not hibernate and are the only bee to make honey as a food store for winter. They obtain all their food from flowers and blossom; the pollen is fed to larvae and they turn nectar into honey. A colony works as one organism, with individual bees doing what is best for the colony rather than what is best for themselves – this is called a super organism.

The three types of bees in the colony are the Queen, Drones, and the Worker bee. There is only Queen bee per colony who lives for 3 – 5 years with the sole purpose of laying fertilised eggs.

The Drones are male and can live for 6 months, and there are a few hundred per colony. Their only job is to mate with the queen. In the autumn when the bees are preparing for winter the drones are evicted from the hive and will die as they are unable to get their own food.

The Worker bees, who are female, make up the majority of the bees in the colony. They have a barbed stinger which they will only use if they feel threatened or to defend the hive, sadly if they do sting it will cause them to die. Adult workers born in the summer live for 6 weeks; the first 3 weeks are spent in the hive and the last 3 weeks are spent foraging for honey and nectar. Winter bees, born in the autumn, will live for 6 months to get the colony through until the following spring when the queen will start laying eggs again.

The presentation left us with a clear understanding of what we can do to ensure that pollinators can thrive in our church grounds.
